May Day Traditions





What is May Day?

May Day is a celebration dating back to our pagan heritage and mark the new cycle of growth and fertility in nature across the UK. In Gaelic, it's known as 'Beltane', which was when the summer pastures open for livestock.



How do we celebrate May Day?

There are lots of traditions and superstitions associated with May Day, particularly during the Victorian era – from waking up before dawn and going outside to wash your face in the dew, from gathering flowers and creating garlands for friends to wear.

Traditions often include gathering wildflowers and green branches, weaving floral garlands, crowning a May Queen (sometimes with a male companion), and setting up a Maypole, May Tree or May Bush, around which people dance. Morris dancing is often seen as part of may day celebrations.

What is Maypole Dancing?

A traditional May Day dance is Maypole Dancing. On May Day, people used to cut down young trees and stick them in the ground in the village to mark the arrival of summer. People danced around the tree poles in celebration of the end of winter and the start of the fine weather that would allow planting to begin.

Why not?

Celebrate May Day by going for a walk and enjoy the flowers and nature around you?

Try making some May Day themed cakes to share with your friends?

Plant some spring flowers in your garden with your family, these not only look lovely but also helps the bees and butterflies.

Draw a beautiful basket of spring flowers?





Peer on Peer abuse: What to do.

Always speak up!

You might not see someone being abused but you might be worried about them.

You might think they are being abused by someone they don't know or someone they have told you about

It's really important for you to tell someone even if you are just worried, but haven't seen any abuse.

Tell the to stop!

You can also tell the abuser to stop. If telling them to stop makes you feel too scared or worried that they might hurt you, *tell someone so they can help*.

How can I stop abuse from happening?

Help others when they are in need.

Be kind, friendly and respectful to others.

Think about people's feelings before we say or do something

Talk to someone when you are worried.
