RELATIONSHIPS AND SEX EDUCATION POLICY

1. SCHOOL MISSION STATEMENT

'We are created in the image of God, we strive to love and serve Him in all we do.

With the Gospel Values at the centre of our school, we aim to value, welcome, understand and support others. We do this in partnership with family and parish.'

In this policy the Governors and teachers, in partnership with pupils and their parents, set out their intentions about relationships and sex education (RSHE).

2. CONSULTATION

- Pupil focus groups/school council (completed **July 2022**)
- Questionnaires to parents/carers, any meetings etc. new PHSE and RSHE curriculum parent consultation (completed **January 2021**)
- Questionnaires to parents/carers, any meetings etc. Ten:Ten parent consultation (completed July 2022)

Results:

A consultation with parents was held for the implementation of Ten:Ten. Ten:Ten is a scheme of learning which supports the RSHE curriculum requirements while underpinning Catholic beliefs. A google form was used to collect data and 14 responses were submitted.

- 93.3% of parents agreed that they understood what their child will be taught.
- 86.7% of parents agreed that they are comfortable with the Catholic ethos of the program.
- 86.7% agreed they trust the school's judgment in delivering this program.
- 100% agreed that they feel their child will need additional support in understanding some of this content.
- 100% agreed they understand and accept their role as the 'first educator' of their child on matters related to teaching human sexuality.

- 86.6% agreed they would value further support from school about how to talk to their child about sensitive issues.
- 92.8% agreed they approve of their child learning the names of external genitalia in KS1.
- 60% agreed that Year 4 is a good time to start learning about physical changes during puberty.
- 80% agreed that they are happy for their child to be taught about sexual intimacy in Year 6, in a way that is respectful of Catholic beliefs.
- 86.7% agreed that it is important that pornography is covered from an internet safety perspective.
- 60% agreed that it is important that pornography is discussed as a way in which people are 'used.'
- 93.3% agreed they would like further details regarding the optional content around these 'key decisions.' Please see appendix 1 for full report.

As a result of these responses a letter was sent to parents who took part inviting them to discuss details and content of the scheme and learning in more detail. An information leaflet was also sent to all parents and carers on further detail regarding the content of RSHE.

All classes were consulted on how they feel about RSHE and our scheme of learning. See appendix 2 for full report. As a result teachers will be supported further through CPD from the RSHE leads to ensure pupils are confident in their knowledge of the subject and scheme of learning. Staff were consulted during staff meetings.

- Review of RSHE curriculum content with staff and pupils (ongoing)
- Consultation with wider school community e.g. school nurse (**September 2022**)
- Consultation with school governors (**September 2022**)

3. IMPLEMENTATION AND REVIEW OF POLICY

Implementation of the policy will take place after consultation with the Governors in the **Advent term 2022.** This policy will be reviewed every 2 years by the Head Teacher, RSE leads, the Governing Body and Staff. The next review date is **Advent term 2024.**

4. DISSEMINATION

The draft policy will be given to all members of the Governing Body, and all teaching and non-teaching members of staff. Copies of the document will be available to all parents/carers through the school office. Details of the content of the RSHE curriculum will also be published on the school's web site – **26**th **September 2022.**

5. DEFINING RELATIONSHIPS AND SEX EDUCATION

The DfE guidance states that "children and young people need to know how to be safe and healthy, and how to manage their academic, personal and social lives in a positive way". It is about the development of the pupils' knowledge and understanding of themselves as a sexual being, about what it means to be fully human, called to live in right relationships with self and others and being enabled to make moral decisions in conscience. In primary schools the focus should be on "teaching the fundamental building blocks and characteristics of positive relationships, with particular reference to friendships, family relationships, and relationships with other children and with adults." This would include the topics of families and the people who care for me, caring friendships, respectful relationships, online relationships and being safe. It should enable them to know what a healthy relationship looks like and what makes a good friend, a good colleague and a successful marriage or other type of committed relationship.

6. STATUTORY CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS

We are legally required to teach those aspects of RSHE which are statutory parts of National Curriculum Science. Relationships and sex education (RSHE) is an important part of PSHE education. Relationships education is compulsory for all primary school pupils.

7. RATIONALE

'I HAVE COME THAT YOU MIGHT HAVE LIFE AND HAVE IT TO THE FULL' John 10:10. We are involved in relationships and sex education precisely because of our Christian beliefs about God and about the human person. The belief in the unique dignity of the human person made in the image and likeness of God underpins the approach to all education in a Catholic school. Our approach to RSHE therefore is rooted in the Catholic Church's teaching of the human person and presented in a positive framework of Christian ideals.

At the heart of the Christian life is the Trinity; Father, Son and the Holy Spirit in communion, united in loving relationship and embracing all people and all creation. As a consequence of the Christian belief that we are made in the image and likeness of God, gender and sexuality are seen as God's gift, reflect God's beauty, and share in the divine creativity. RSHE, therefore, will be placed firmly within the context of relationship as it is there that sexuality grows and develops.

Following the guidance of the Bishops of England and Wales and as advocated by the DfE, RSHE will be firmly embedded in the PSHE framework as it is concerned with nurturing human wholeness and integral to the physical, spiritual, emotional, moral, social and intellectual development of pupils. It is centred on Christ's vision of being human as good news and will be positive and prudent, showing the potential for development, while enabling the dangers and risks involved to be understood and appreciated.

All RSHE will be in accordance with the Church's moral teaching. It will emphasise the central importance of marriage and the family whilst acknowledging that all pupils have a fundamental right to have their life respected whatever household they come from. It will also prepare pupils for life in modern Britain.

8. VALUES AND VIRTUES

Our programme enshrines Catholic values relating to the importance of stable relationships, marriage and family life. It also promotes those virtues which are essential in responding to God's call to love others with a proper respect for their dignity and the dignity of the human body. The

following virtues will be explicitly explored and promoted: 'faithfulness, fruitfulness, chastity, integrity, prudence, mercy and compassion.'

9. AIM OF RSHE AND THE MISSION STATEMENT

Our Mission Statement commits us to the education of the whole child (spiritual, physical, intellectual, moral, social, cultural, emotional) and we believe that RSHE is an integral part of this education. Furthermore, our school aims state that we will endeavour to raise pupils' self-esteem, help them to grow in knowledge and understanding, recognise the value of all persons and develop caring and sensitive attitudes. It is in this context that we commit ourselves:

In partnership with parents, to provide children and young people with a "positive and prudent sexual education" which is compatible with their physical, cognitive, psychological, and spiritual maturity, and rooted in a Catholic vision of education and the human person.

10.OBJECTIVES

To develop the following attitudes and virtues:

- reverence for the gift of human sexuality and fertility;
- respect for the dignity of every human being in their own person and in the person of others;
- joy in the goodness of the created world and their own bodily natures;
- responsibility for their own actions and a recognition of the impact of these on others;
- recognising and valuing their own sexual identity and that of others;
- celebrating the gift of life-long, self-giving love;
- recognising the importance of marriage and family life;
- fidelity in relationships.

To develop the following personal and social skills:

- making sound judgements and good choices which have integrity, and which are respectful
 of the individual's commitments;
- loving and being loved, and the ability to form friendships and loving, stable relationships

- free from exploitation, abuse and bullying;
- managing emotions within relationships, and when relationships break down, with confidence, sensitivity and dignity;
- managing conflict positively, recognising the value of difference;
- cultivating humility, mercy and compassion, learning to forgive and be forgiven;
- developing self-esteem and confidence, demonstrating self-respect and empathy for others;
- building resilience and the ability to resist unwanted pressures, recognising the influence and impact of the media, internet and peer groups and so developing the ability to assess pressures and respond appropriately;
- being patient, delaying gratification and learning to recognise the appropriate stages in the development of relationships, and how to love chastely;
- assessing risks and managing behaviours in order to minimise the risk to health and personal integrity.

To know and understand:

- the Church's teaching on relationships and the nature and meaning of sexual love;
- the Church's teaching on marriage and the importance of marriage and family life;
- the centrality and importance of virtue in guiding human living and loving;
- the physical and psychological changes that accompany puberty;
- the facts about human reproduction, how love is expressed sexually and how sexual love plays an essential and sacred role in procreation;
- how to manage fertility in a way which is compatible with their stage of life, their own values
 and commitments, including an understanding of the difference between natural family
 planning and artificial contraception;
- how to keep themselves safe from sexually transmitted infections and how to avoid unintended pregnancy, including where to go for advice.

<u>Outcomes</u>

11.INCLUSION AND DIFFERENTIATED LEARNING

We will ensure RSHE is sensitive to the different needs of individual pupils in respect to pupils' different abilities, levels of maturity and personal circumstances; for example, their own sexual orientation, faith or culture and is taught in a way that does not subject pupils to discrimination. Lessons will also help children to realise the nature and consequences of discrimination, teasing, bullying and aggressive behaviours (including cyber-bullying), use of prejudice-based language and how to respond and ask for help. (In looking at these questions, it is important to draw links to the school's inclusion policy). Children will be taught using a two year cycle taken from the RSHE intent document, ensuring differentiated objectives are taught in a split year group.

12. EQUALITIES OBLIGATIONS

The governing body have wider responsibilities under the Equality Act 2010 and will ensure that our school strives to do the best for all pupils, irrespective of disability, educational needs, race, nationality, ethnic or national origin, pregnancy, maternity, sex, gender identity, religion or sexual orientation or whether they are looked-after children.

13. BROAD CONTENT OF RSHE

Three aspects of RSHE – attitudes and values, knowledge and understanding, and personal and social skills – will be provided in three inter-related ways: the whole school ethos dimension; a cross-curricular dimension and a specific relationships and sex curriculum.

Our programme Ten:Ten will cover three units of learning; created and loved by God, created to love others and created to live in community. It is a leading provider of faith-based resources for Catholic primary schools and is taught with a spiral approach to learning in which pupils will revisit the same topics at an age-appropriate stage through their school life, the programme includes teaching about personal health, physical and emotional well-being, strong emotions, private parts of the body, personal relationships, family structures, trusted adults, growing bodies, puberty, periods, life cycles, the dangers of social media, where babies come from, an understanding of the Common Good and living in the wider world. The entire teaching is underpinned with a Christian faith understanding

that our deepest identity is as a child of God – created, chosen and loved by God. The programme is fully inclusive of all pupils and their families.

14.PROGRAMME / RESOURCES

The curriculum intent and overview for PSHE will provide further information regarding the programme. Please use the PSHE policy in conjunction with this policy.

Teaching strategies will include:

- establishing ground rules
- distancing techniques
- discussion
- project learning
- reflection
- experiential
- active participation
- brainstorming
- film & video
- group work
- role-play
- trigger drawings
- values clarification

15.ASSESSMENT

Children will use baseline and endpoint assessment tasks provided by Ten:Ten. Teachers will look at the different responses before and after the unit and assess whether children have developed their understanding of the learning intentions. This will be based on teacher knowledge and recorded in PSHE books.

16.PARENTS AND CARERS

We recognise that parents (and other carers who stand in their place) are the primary educators of their children. As a Catholic school, we provide the principal means by which the Church assists parents and carers in educating their children. Therefore the school will support parents and carers by providing material to be shared with their children at home and workshops to help parents/carers to find out more. Year 6 parents/carers will be informed by a letter when the more sensitive aspects of RSHE will be covered in order that they can be prepared to talk and answer questions about their children's learning.

Parents must be consulted before this policy is ratified by the governors. They will be consulted at every stage of the development of the RSHE programme, as well as during the process of monitoring, review and evaluation. They will be able to view the resources used by the school in the RSHE programme. Our aim is that, at the end of the consultation process, every parent and carer will have full confidence in the school's RSHE programme to meet their child's needs.

Parents continue to have the right to withdraw their children from Sex Education except in those elements which are required by the National Curriculum science orders. Should parents wish to withdraw their children they are asked to notify the school by contacting the Headteacher. The school will provide support by providing material for parents to help the children with their learning.

We believe that the controlled environment of the classroom is the safest place for this curriculum to be followed. Please refer to the DfE guidance Page 17 for further details on the right to be excused from sex education (commonly referred to as the right to withdraw).

17.BALANCED CURRICULUM

Whilst promoting Catholic values and virtues and teaching in accordance with Church teaching, we will ensure that pupils are offered a balanced programme by providing an RSE programme that offers a range of viewpoints on issues. Pupils will also receive clear scientific information as well as covering the aspects of the law pertaining to RSHE. Knowing about facts and enabling young people to explore differing viewpoints is not the same as promoting behaviour and is not incompatible with our school's promotion of Catholic teaching. We will ensure that pupils have access to the learning they need to stay safe, healthy and understand their rights as individuals.

18. RESPONSIBILITY FOR TEACHING THE PROGRAMME

Responsibility for the specific relationships and sex education programme lays with PSHE and RSHE lead, RE and RSHE lead, Science lead and PE lead. However, all staff will be involved in developing the attitudes and values aspect of the RSHE programme. They will be role models for pupils of good, healthy, wholesome relationships as between staff, other adults and pupils. They will also be contributing to the development of pupils' personal and social skills.

19.EXTERNAL VISITORS

Our school will often call upon help and guidance from outside agencies and health specialists to deliver aspects of RSHE. Such visits will always complement the current programme and never substitute or replace teacher led sessions. It is important that any external visitor is clear about their role and responsibility whilst they are in school delivering a session. Any visitor must adhere to our code of practice developed in line with 'Checklist for External Speakers to Schools.'(CES) guidance. Health professionals should follow the school's policies, including the Safeguarding Policy or inappropriate comments using negotiated ground rules and distancing techniques as other teachers would. They will ensure that all teaching is rooted in Catholic principles and practice.

20. OTHER ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES REGARDING RSHE

Governors

- in consultation with parents and teachers;
- ensure that the policy is available to parents;
- ensure that the policy is in accordance with other whole school policies, e.g., special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), the ethos of the school and our Christian beliefs;
- ensure that parents know of their right to withdraw their children;
- establish a link governor to share in the monitoring and evaluation of the programme, including resources used;
- ensure that the policy provides proper and adequate coverage of relevant National Curriculum science topics and the setting of RSHE within PSHE.

Head Teacher

The Head teacher takes overall delegated responsibility for the implementation of this policy and for liaison with the Governing Body, parents, NRCDES, the Local Education Authority, and appropriate agencies.

PSHE/RSHE Lead

The PSHE/RSHE Lead with the head teacher has a general responsibility for supporting other members of staff in the implementation of this policy and will provide a lead in the dissemination of the information relating to RSHE and the provision of in-service training. They will be supported by the senior leadership team.

All Staff

RSHE is a whole school issue. All teachers have a responsibility of care; as well as fostering academic progress they should actively contribute to the guardianship and guidance of the physical, moral and spiritual well-being of their pupils. Teachers will be expected to teach RSHE in accordance with the Catholic Ethos of the school. Appropriate training will be made available for all staff teaching RSHE. Staff have been included in the development of this policy and all staff should be aware of the policy and how it relates to them.

21. RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER POLICIES AND CURRICULUM SUBJECTS

This RSHE policy is to be delivered as part of the PSHE framework. It includes guidelines about pupil safety and is compatible with the school's other policy documents (for example, Policies relevant to bullying, Safeguarding Policy etc.) Pupils with particular difficulties whether of a physical or intellectual nature will receive appropriately differentiated support in order to enable them to achieve mature knowledge, understanding and skills. Teaching methods will be adapted to meet the varying needs of this group of pupils.

Learning about RSHE in PSHE classes will link to/complement learning in those areas identified in the PSHE curriculum intent.

Children's Questions

The governors want to promote a healthy, positive atmosphere in which RSHE can take place. They want to ensure that pupils can ask questions freely, be confident that their questions will be answered, and be sure that they will be free from bullying or harassment from other children and young people.

22. CONTROVERSAL AND SENITIVE ISSUES

There will always be sensitive or controversial issues in the field of RSHE. These may be a matter of maturity, of personal involvement or experience of children, of disagreement with the official teaching of the Church, of illegal activity or other doubtful, dubious or harmful activity. The governors believe that children are best educated, protected from harm and exploitation by discussing such issues openly within the context of the RSHE programme. The use of ground rules, negotiated between teachers and pupils, will help to create a supportive climate for discussion. Some questions may raise issues which it would not be appropriate for teachers to answer during ordinary class time, e.g. where a child or young person's questions hint at abuse, is deliberately tendentious or is of a personal nature. In any case of a disclosure it is the teacher's responsibility to report to DSL (Designated Safeguarding Lead) and use CPOMS (Child Protection Online Management System.

23. SUPPORTING CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE WHO ARE AT RISK

Children will also need to feel safe and secure in the environment in which RSHE takes place. Effective RSHE will provide opportunities for discussion of what is and is not appropriate in relationships. Such discussion may well lead to disclosure of a safeguarding issue. Teachers will need to be aware of the needs of their pupils and not let any fears and worries go unnoticed. Where a teacher suspects that a child or young person is a victim of or is at risk of abuse they are required to follow the school's safeguarding policy and immediately inform the designated senior member of staff responsible.

24.CONFIDENTIALITY AND ADVICE

All governors, all teachers, all support staff, all parents and all pupils must be made aware of this RSHE policy, particularly as it relates to issues of advice and confidentiality.

All lessons, especially those in the RSHE programme, will have the best interests of pupils at heart, enabling them to grow in knowledge and understanding of relationships and sex, developing appropriate personal and social skills and becoming appreciative of the values and attitudes which underpin the Christian understanding of what it means to be fully human.

Pupils will be encouraged to talk to their parents/carers about the issues which are discussed in the programme. Teachers will always help pupils facing personal difficulties. Teachers should explain to pupils that they cannot offer unconditional confidentiality, in matters which are illegal or abusive for instance. Teachers will explain that in such circumstances they would have to inform others, e.g. Designated Safeguarding Lead. In some circumstances, school wouldn't inform the parents before liaising with Social Care if to do so would place the child at immediate risk of harm, but that the pupils would always be informed first that such action was going to be taken.

25. MONITORING AND EVALUATION

The RSHE Leads will monitor the provision of the various dimensions of the programme by examining plans, schemes of work and samples of pupils work at regular intervals. The programme will be evaluated biannually by means of questionnaires, response sheets, assessment of learning, book trawls and by discussion with pupils, staff and parents. The results of the evaluation should be reported to these groups of interested parties and their suggestions sought for improvements. Governors will consider all such evaluations and suggestions before amending the policy. Governors remain ultimately responsible for the policy.
